

to Annapolis Royal, Nova Scotia

"When a physician makes the move to enter practice in Nova Scotia, the possibilities are endless"

Fate—and the vision of a looming mid-life crisis—brought Dr. Simon Bonnington, his wife, and two children to Annapolis Royal, Nova Scotia nearly a decade ago.

Dr. Bonnington graduated from Bristol University (1990) and completed his Family Medicine residency in South West England (1995) prior to immigrating to Nova Scotia in 2010. His pathway from UK medicine predated the newly established physician stream, which has been created to reduce barriers for physicians. He calls his conviction to relocate pure destiny.

Working in the Collaborative Practice in Annapolis Royal in rural Nova Scotia, Dr. Bonnington enjoys seeing how the small community he has embraced as his home can benefit from the health care opportunities provided by members of his practice group. The collaborative practice physicians and administration work with "an amazing patient-group" whose expectations for health care delivery are generally reasonable and well balanced.

The beauty of Nova Scotia, according to Dr.
Bonnington, is that you are able to be more
relaxed about life. Their small but vibrantly active

community provides an abundance of art and culture, and many diverse outdoor recreational activities like hiking, fishing, and soccer.

Bonnington is well known in his community for his variety of interests and community service. The family has been heavily involved in the creation of the province's second largest indoor rock climbing facility at the local gym, and he maintains an active life outside of work that ranges from volunteer service at the local botanical garden to both directing and performing on stage with the local acting troupe. The couple also enjoy their location in the province and its proximity to so many great local farms and vineyards.

Dr. Greg Hirsch

Cardiac Surgeon

Immigrated **1,063.3 km**from Boston



to Dartmouth, Nova Scotia

"After 25 years of practice, I am still absolutely thrilled to come to work every day."

Originally from Boston, MA, Dr. Greg Hirsch has called Nova Scotia home since 1995. He attended medical school at Mount Sinai University in New York City and completed his residency at Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston. With three years of research training at Harvard Medical School, Dr. Hirsch cultivated his passion for academics and research as a cardiac surgeon and later accepted an offer to work in Dartmouth, Nova Scotia.

"I was relieved of all my anxieties during the immigration process because I knew Nova Scotia was willing and able to help me start my practice." He had been working in a tight job market for physicians with academic training, but was able to establish his laboratory and research almost immediately after arriving in Canada. As a cardiac surgeon in the province of Nova Scotia, he has the opportunity to apply his research training, develop his skills, and have a boundary-spanning career by continuing his research in cardiac health services.

For Dr. Hirsch, the best part about working as a physician in Nova Scotia is that everyone has access to care. "I revel in the fact that I live in a place where I am able to practice socialized medicine." When a physician practices medicine in a place like Halifax, they are able to identify the need and, in turn, see the impact. With the help of reliable colleagues, Dr. Hirsch provides high-quality care to his community. "I consider my colleagues my friends. All the clinicians I interact with have each other's backs."

He says the multicultural nature of Halifax is brilliantly refreshing and provided the perfect dynamic environment in which to raise his five children.

In Nova Scotia, families have the choice between high-quality private and public schools as well as Canadian universities at a fraction of the cost of other countries. Plus, regardless where in the country his children study, the trip home is accessible thanks to the Halifax International Airport.

Dr. Hirsch is grateful for the accessibility and affordability of the city—he can bike to work in 18 minutes, whereas his friends in larger cosmopolitan areas spend 45 minutes in traffic. He states that whether you want an urban home or a waterfront property, it is possible in Nova Scotia. "We live in a beautiful, relatively unspoiled province where it takes no time to get outside." His family takes advantage of this by going on hikes to Ski Wentworth to enjoy the view of the Northumberland Strait. They also spend time at their cottage in Chester where they sail and paddle board.

If you ask Cheticamp's "town doctor", Dr. Michel Chiasson his favourite part about working and living as a physician in Nova Scotia, his reply will be lengthy.

After attending medical school and completing residency at Dalhousie University, Dr. Chiasson moved to Montreal before joining a collaborative practice in rural Nova Scotia. He says the scope of practice that a rural environment offers a physician is ideal for broadening their experience.

"None of our physicians are isolated. There is a lot of opportunity to work with teams."

The degree of collaboration between his colleagues and specialists, nurses, and other health care providers in a variety of different places makes for a rewarding career. "Just because I'm a rural doctor, doesn't mean that's my only hat." He believes that physicians can still be involved provincially, nationally, academically,

in research, and in many other ways—and still be a country doctor. Dr. Chiasson's involvement with the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Nova Scotia and with Doctors Nova Scotia is evidence of this.

When he isn't working at his practice or providing care in his region, you can find Dr. Chiasson, his wife, and his three children embracing small town luxuries. Dirt-biking, paddle-boarding, having bonfires on the nearby beach, and eating delicious east coast seafood are some of the many ways his family enjoys their safe community. They are also avid travellers and he insists that he never feels "stuck" in their beloved corner of Nova Scotia.

Practice Opportunities

We have full-time practice and locum opportunities available throughout the province in both family practice settings and specialties. We also offer a range of incentive programs to help you get settled.

Licensing

You may be able to obtain a license to practice in Canada if you graduated from an eligible medical school and have training and certification from the US, Ireland, United Kingdom, or Australia. If you have adequate practice experience in your host country, you may also be exempt from further licensure examinations. First, you must confirm that you are license eligible by contacting the Nova Scotia College of Physicians and Surgeons. If you are not eligible for a license, you may be interested in Practice Ready Assessment, an alternative pathway towards licensure for family physicians. World-class Academic and Research Opportunities

Nova Scotia's 10 universities and many colleges have created a well-educated population, a youthful entrepreneurial spirit, and a depth of opportunity for professionals of every stripe. Other Incentive and Support Programs

Nova Scotia offers a variety of generous incentive programs including:

Relocation allowance program

If you have an accepted offer for work in Nova Scotia, you may be eligible for a relocation allowance of up to **\$10,000**.

Debt assistance program

If you choose to practice as a specialist or family physician in Nova Scotia, you could be eligible to receive between **\$20,000-\$45,000** in debt-assistance for up to three years. Eligible applicants include new medical school graduates in family practice or designated specialties, graduates of medical schools in Atlantic Canada, and Nova Scotia residents graduating from other Canadian medical schools.

Return of service family medicine bursary program

Family Medicine residents could receive a \$60,000 bursary for establishing a practice in Nova Scotia. The return of service is for a three-year period in the agreed upon location.

Bursary payments include:

- **\$10,000** on signing the return of service agreement and on provision of verification of a CARMS/NRMP match in a family medicine residency training program.
- \$20,000 on signing agreement regarding practice location and deliverables.
- \$30,000 on starting to practice in Nova Scotia in the agreed upon location.
- Eligible residents include: Family Medicine residents in Canadian programs, including those enroled in PGY3 in Emergency Medicine (CFPC Emergency Medicine Program); Nova Scotians doing their Family Medicine residency in accredited programs in the U.S.; and fourth-year medical students from Nova Scotia. Note, residents/medical students with pre-existing return of service agreements/ obligations are not eligible to apply.

Physician Tuition Relief Program

Graduates of Canadian medical schools may receive reimbursement for the tuition they paid during medical school up to a maximum of \$120,000. International medical graduates may receive reimbursement up to the maximum tuition level they would have paid at a Canadian medical school. Physicians/residents are eligible if they will be

practicing in Nova Scotia where an approved vacancy is available and where deliverables have been agreed to. All physicians/residents (family physicians and specialists; graduates from both Canadian and international medical schools) are eligible to apply. You can apply during residency, or if currently practicing outside of Nova Scotia, during the first seven years of practice after completing residency training.

The Physician Stream assists Nova Scotia's public health authorities—the Nova Scotia Health Authority (NSHA) and the Izaak Walton Killam Health Centre (IWK)—to hire general practitioners, family physicians, and specialist physicians to work in Nova Scotia. The stream helps the NSHA and IWK to recruit and retain physicians with the required skills for positions that they have been unable to fill with a permanent resident or Canadian citizen.

Eligibility

The Physician Stream is only open to general practitioners and family physicians (NOC 3112) and specialist physicians (NOC 3111) with signed, approved opportunities with the Nova Scotia Health Authority or the IWK Health Centre.

The approved opportunity must be on official NSHA or IWK letterhead and must:

- Be signed and dated by a person authorized to hire physicians at the NSHA or IWK
- Be signed and dated by the applicant who is accepting the opportunity
- Indicate eligibility for licensure with the College of Physicians and Surgeons of NS
- Indicate that the applicant is eligible to apply for privileges and credentials with NSHA and the IWK
